## **CLOSE PASS**

A fter reading Tim Devereux's letter on close passes (April/May), I thought readers might be interested in the work that Taunton Area Cycling Campaign has been doing on this widespread issue. I attach photos of the hi-vis vest we designed. We also have backpack covers with the same artwork.

We commissioned 20 street boards, based on a design from Cumbria, which were put up by Somerset Council's Traffic Team. All of this was funded by the Avon and Somerset Police Road Safety Fund. The police have been very supportive and made a video of the campaign, which they publicised. We have been waiting two years for the second phase of this.

We did some monitoring of feedback from vest/backpack users. A large majority felt that the impact on driver behaviour had been positive. We make the vests available for free at events and through a local shop (**mycarboncoach. co.uk**). We're not able to mail out our vests or backpack covers but can provide the artwork to any groups/individuals who are interested in using it.

#### **ALT BARS**

As someone who's been experimenting with a set of On-One Geoff bars, I found your article on alt bars very interesting.



I'm surprised that no one's mentioned the effect of stem length on handling though. The backsweep

of these bars can result in the hands being placed behind the head tube, which I found made the steering feel very strange.

Jeff Jones designed this style of handlebar to match his bikes, which use a shorter top tube design compared with a standard mountain bike. With that in mind I found they worked best on a bike designed for a drop bar, rather than a flat bar, as such frames have a shorter reach.

On my own 'Haute Gravel' custom adventure frame, I think they give much more comfort and control compared to the flared drop bar that I used previously. With the 90mm stem I'm using, the forward loop gives a similar position to being on the hoods.
